## Second year of programme a big success

The second year of the sponsorship program through FACE was a huge success with a total of 142 deserving children sponsored to receive primary school education. On March 10, 2008 George Piprah and a group of seven volunteers, most of them from Friendship Baptist Church in Coquitlam, BC, arrived in Accra, Ghana, West Africa to launch the second FACE sponsorship season. It was the first time in Africa for all the volunteers so you can imagine the apprehension upon arrival. There was only a day of rest and, despite the jet lag, the team was on the road on the second day after arrival.

The first village the volunteers visited was Ejura, about 45 kilometres north of Kumasi. Susan Eyer-son from Langley, BC, who had been in this town earlier, supervised the selection of the children to ensure they qualified under our criteria. In total 32 children were sponsored in this village. At the ceremony to present the sponsorship kits to the chil-

dren, the headmasters of three of the schools and some local politicians were in attendance.

The next day, three of our Ghana Directors (Nana Opoku Wereko, Eric Owusu and Joyce Wereko Ampim) joined the team and traveled 230 kilometres east of Accra to the village of Agbozume in the Volta region, only five miles from the Aflao border town. The team received quite a reception there! As a surprise, the local school cultural dance group greeted the team with the Eve Cultural dance and singing.

The team met with the 15 selected children and their parents. Many of the local teachers expressed their appreciation for the sponsorship given to these needy children. The local FACE coordinator there was Eric Fiamordzi, a local magistrate and a well-respected citizen of the town. Mr. Fiamordzi had carefully selected the children based

on FACE's need criteria. Through interviews with the children and their parents, it was evident that they were truly in difficult financial situations.

The following day took the team to Mankoadze in the central region where we met with 15 sponsored children and their parents on the grounds of the local school. In attendance was the Nkonsoo (progress) chief of the village, Mr. Yankson and some of the local dignitaries.

After Mankoadze the team proceeded to Cape Coast and toured the famous Elmina Castle before relaxing at a local hotel in Cape Coast. Bright and early the next morning, the team visited Kakum National Park about 25 kilometres away. By noon we drove on to Assin Anyinabirim, also in the central region, where they with a similar number of children and their parents.

In the late afternoon, the team continued on to Kumasi, the capital of the Ashanti region; it was a journey of about 150 kilometres. We stayed for four nights and used Kumasi as a base from where Bodoma and Afoako were visited over a three day period. While in Kumasi, some time was taken to visit the famous Manhyia Palace of Ashanti Chief.

In all these six villages, the programme was conducted in a similar manner: the team talked generally to the children, parents, and local dignitaries about the importance of education and how FACE believes that the best way for these not-so-fortunate kids to break out of the cycle of poverty was through education.

Personal testimonies were given to the children by George Piprah, (Hon. Consul-General for Ghana in BC), Joyce Wereko Ampim, head of Human Resources at SSNIT in Accra, Nana Opoku Wereko, Manager of Ecobank in Accra and Eric Owusu, Professor of Botany at University of Ghana, Legon. The message to the children in these testimonies was that all the mentioned people were once little Ghanaian children growing up in a similar village but, through education, these people were able to break the cycle and become useful members of society. In short, the message to the children was “if we can do it through similar circumstances, so can you”. In each gathering, the team broke into three groups and conducted a private counselling session with the child and parent where the criteria for continued support through sponsors and FACE was emphasized.

It was a joyous meeting with the children although it was difficult to say no to some needy children in each village who showed up to plead their case for inclusion.

All our volunteers returned home with a sense of satisfaction that together we are making a small difference in the lives of these kids, that although the need is greater, together we are making a big difference in the life of the children. Tanis Blomly, one of the volunteers remarked, “It is like the proverbial saving of one shellfish among the hundreds on the beach; together we are making a difference one child at a time!”

In 2007, I had the pleasure of volunteering in a village in Ghana, Africa. It was immediately easy to fall in love with the friendly and peaceful Ghanaian people. 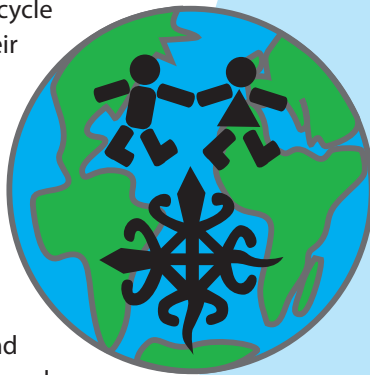

### Our mission

- We personally deliver to the child and his or her parent a kit containing essential school supplies: 2 sets of school uniforms, a pair of sandals, 2 dozen exercise books, pens, pencils, and a dictionary all in a nice backpack. To help with providing lunches we also give \$50 to the parent.

### Criteria for on-going support of a child

- Child must stay in school. The monitoring committee in the village must certify this.
- Money must be used for the intended purpose.
- The child must continue to do well in school.
